GALLOPING BY LEAPS+ **BOUNDS.** In 2012, Group Health and GLY debuted the first


ever Goblin Gallop at Marymoor

raised \$68,000 for the Foundation's Childhood Immunization Initiative, focused on increasing childhood immunizations and preventing childhood diseases, such as last year's whooping cough epidemic. You can help the cause by urging families to vaccinate against pertussis.

Jeff was touched by Chuck's creativity and generosity, and is so thankful to the field crew, designers, subcontractors, inspectors and clients who rode Chuck's manlift and gifted their small bills for this great cause.

FORTERRA C3 – TURNING CARBON INTO FRESH AIR. Forterra's mission to protect, enhance and steward our state's most precious resources – both its communities and

landscapes – fills a unique niche.
Their C3 carbon mitigating idea
was simple; therefore brilliant. It
turns a calculation of a business'
operational carbon footprint into
newly planted trees who take that
carbon out of circulation.





Last year, we joined Forterra's C3 [Carbon Capturing Companies] founding partnership of 13 businesses who commit to be responsible for the carbon they produce: by assessing and reducing it; then by paying for it. Our assessment purchased 178 baby trees planted in the Leschi neighborhood's Frink Park. Last spring, a GLY work party mulched, weeded and nurtured the saplings, and next year, we'll grow our little patch of forest bigger with a second planting.

YEAR. Like clockwork every fall,
NAIOP sponsors a community
enhancement project that draws
